 is home to students and adults from some di erent countries. The stunning natural setting provides both and exceptional opportunities for outdoor activities including hiking, skiing, and climbing.

Each family is headed by two or three teachers and lives in one of the school's chalets. Families eat together in the common dining hall, and each Wednesday is a dedicated Family Evening when Ecole families spend time together playing games, cooking, or working on projects. Living in a mixed group of students of both sexes and various ages and cultures helps everyone to

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The Ecole d'Humanité functions as a community and students take charge of such important tasks as organizing weekend activities, delivering rewood, taking care of the goats, running the library, and raising awareness of global and environmental issues. Some are active in the Student Council or involved in peer counseling. Everyone participates in the weekly school meeting, which is chaired by students. At this weekly Schulgemeinde , students can address both individual and community concerns, learning to nd their own voices within a public forum.
